About the Gamer Symphony Orchestra

In the fall of 2005, Michelle Eng decided she wanted to be in an orchestral group that played video game music. With four others from the University of Maryland Repertoire Orchestra, she founded GSO to achieve that dream. By the time of the ensemble's first public performance in the spring of 2006, its size had quadrupled.

Today, GSO provides a musical and social outlet to over 100 members. It is the world's first college-level ensemble solely dedicated to video game music as an emerging art form. Aside from its concerts, the orchestra also runs "Deathmatch for Charity," a video game tournament in the spring. All proceeds benefit Children's National Medical Center in Washington, D.C., via the "Child's Play" charity (www.childsplay.org).



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Video Game Orchestra

VGO, founded by a Berklee College of Music alumni Shota Nakama, is an orchestra that performs contemporary arrangements of video game music. As the first and only New England based orchestra that focuses on showcasing interactive media compositions, VGO is dedicated to provide access and raise awareness of orchestral video game-related compositions.

Comprised of a chamber orchestra, a 5-piece rock band, and a choir, the regional and international award-winning musicians come from over 20 countries. This multi-cultural diversity background contributes to the unique sonic signature of VGO.

VGO's debut concert was on July 2008 in front of about 200 people at a small Boston chapel. Since then, the success and audience number have been growing along the way. The latest concerts at PAX East 2010 won VGO an acclaim for our outstanding performance from the 7500 people who were at the concert.

Magruder GSO

In December of 2008, two students from Magruder High School founded the Magruder Gamer Symphony Orchestra (GSO). Inspired by a similar group at the University of Maryland, the Magruder GSO is a instrumental ensemble of high school students dedicated to the arrangement and performance of video game music. Completely student administrated and organized, the Magruder GSO performs regularly at Magruder music concerts as the only non-classroom ensemble. Their next performance is at 7:30 PM, May 13 2010 at Mcgruder High School "Hyrulian Highlands"

Link uses his mystic (and musical) control of the winds to sail from island to island in the Great Sea. Each stop brings him closer to defeating his nemesis, Ganondorf, who has kidnapped Link's sister. This arrangement elaborates on the Celtic hints in the "Wind Waker" soundtrack. The orchestra imitates the drone of bagpipes and the lilt of the chanter throughout the piece. Attentive listeners might detect nods to the scores of Disney's "Bedknobs and Broomsticks," and Lerner and Loewe's musical "Brigadoon."

"Hall of Champions"

"Snake Eater" is the theme music for *Metal Gear Solid 3: Snake Eater*. The entire piece, as well as its accompanying visuals, create a Bond-esque feel, enforcing the Cold War setting. Hibino's words, though simple, aptly describe to the desperation and romance of the game's story, Snake's fight for survival and the love that EVA holds for him. This adaptation is more akin to the jazzier feel of the Japanese version of the song, featured only on the *First Bite* MGS3 preview soundtrack.






The Conductresses (and conductor) of the GSO
